IMPACT & ACCESSIBILITY

To give children a chance to be seen, they have to be able to access the high quality program the Club offers every day. **Accessibility is at the core of our mission.**

The Club was open in 2022 for kids when they needed us most. Youth in our community had the opportunity to enjoy life-enriching opportunities last year thanks to you!

- ⇒ In 2022, the Clubs SURPASSED pre-COVID enrollment numbers with **1,941** total youth registered as Club members.
- ⇒ The Clubs served as many as **620** kids each day across all Club locations — Lincoln Street, Ferguson Crestmont and Ellettsville.
- ⇒ The Club serves kids ages 6 to 18. Teen members are youth ages 13 to 18. In 2022, the Club served more teens then ever before - **297 teens!**

Thanks to the support of local donors, our membership costs remained affordable even as all other prices increased.

Membership is still just \$20 a year per child.

For families who needed us most, just \$20 a year provides Club kids with transportation from school to the Club every day after school, a snack, caring adult mentors, and high-quality out-of-school programming. Rising costs impact families in poverty most of all. The Club keeps costs low for families so ALL kids have access to programs they need every day.

Our high-quality programs enrich the community's youth each weekday while providing the equivalent of **144 school days** of programming each year!

CLUB FAMILIES

The Club is open to all kids and families that want quality out-of-school youth programming. Many families would not have another affordable option if it was not for the Club.

40% of Club family households have a Total Annual Income AT or BELOW \$40,000

33% of Club family households are Single Parent Households

WHAT ARE THEY SAYING?

Each year parents/guardians are asked to participate in the *Club Impact Survey*, which measures the Club's performance. Some key responses include:

- **99%** would recommend the Club to other families in-need of assistance.
- **99%** believe that the Club is a safe place for their child to work, learn, and have fun.
- **96%** believe that at the Club, their child feels like they belong.
- **96%** believe the staff treat their child with respect and listen to what they have to say.
- **91%** believe the Club prepares their child for future success in school, career, and life.

QUALITY PROGRAMS

In 2022, the Club offered more than 70 special programs to spark a child's creativity and get them thinking about their future. These programs are offered at no additional cost to members of the Club. All programs are included in the \$20 a year membership fee. Programs offer a variety of activities that are play based and teach kids new skills and interests. Club programs may introduce kids to a lifelong passion, a hobby or even a career interest. Some programs are core Club programs offered at all times, such as homework center. Others rotate in and out of the schedule based on member interest, staff expertise and funding. Programs are based in the Clubs three core program focus areas—**Academic Success** (including Access to the Arts), **Healthy Lifestyles**, and **Good Character & Active Citizenship**. The happy kid holding the gargantuan amount of garlic bulbs in the picture is named Noah. Noah had never been to a farm before. He didn't want to go help at Martin Hollow Farm this particular Friday because he thought it was too hot and he didn't think it sounded very fun. Maybe he was a little nervous about doing something he'd never done before. But the rest of the group was going and he didn't want to stay behind with the younger kids, so he went.

When he got there, his whole face lit up. "Wow!" he exclaimed, "This place is huge." He jumped off the Club bus, more excited now than nervous. The job today was to pull garlic. The staff and owners of Martin Hollow Farms, Bobbi and Jono, made this farm chore into a competitive game to see who could pull the most garlic.

Noah is very competitive so he was sure he could win. He paid close attention as the farm owners taught them what to do. He wanted to get it right so he could win. As he learned what to do, he was so engaged and curious, asking a number of questions about how the farm works. Noah not only ended up having a much greater time than expected, but he and the others were able to provide a BIG boost of help for the owners of Martin Hollow Farm, by pulling a whole crop of garlic in about an hour! Noah was very proud to have helped Bobbi and Jono. This field trip taught Noah that new things can be fun and worth trying. It also gave him a chance to help others. Funding provided by community donors and partnerships with local organizations and businesses, like Martin Hollow Farm, makes these new experiences and field trips to new places possible for Club kids, like Noah, all year long.

Brian is an 11-year-old member who is full of positive energy! He is always helping others, always willing to engage with programming, and always just a happy kid. However, he does not always have confidence in himself and it is something Club staff work with him on.

Programs at the Club, like National Fitness Competition, are great opportunities for kids, like Brian, to improve their confidence. It allows members to compete in seven individual events, which are formatted similar to a track meet. Members set goals for themselves and then have the opportunity to reflect on their outcomes. It is designed to lead Club members to physical literacy—the ability, confidence and desire to be physically active for life.

Brian was very hesitant to participate at first. Club staff encouraged members, especially Brian, to try it and helped him work through his fears until he felt more comfortable. Brian still showed some hesitation, but he felt confident enough to choose to participate. He had his usual positive attitude during the event and even though he was still a little intimidated and afraid, he completed all events to the best of his ability. He even did better in some of the challenges than he was expecting, which made him feel so proud - and his confidence grew! Funding provided by community donors to the Club gives kids opportunities like this every day—to grow and develop their abilities, confidence and desires to grow into who they want to be.

ELLETTSVILLE

Kylie is a 10-year-old member at the Ellettsville Club. Kylie comes from a single-parent home and her mother needs some extra time to work her second job in the evenings. Her mother enrolled Kylie at the Club in 2022. When she first started attending the Club, she was immensely shy, would often keep her head down and would say very little to those around her. No matter the program, Kylie had a difficult time finding her comfort zone. One of the staff noticed she was having a hard time adjusting and worked with Kylie to find her place.

Through that process, Kylie found a safe place to open up by taking part in the Science Club. Kylie gets to engage with science at an early age through fun, and often messy, experiments like making slime or rock candy, and exploding volcanoes or doing an egg drop. Science Club introduces kids to scientific methods, helps them to develop a love of science, and gives them the confidence to continue studying science further.



As Kylie participates in the Science Club, she continues to blossom. Club Staff have noticed a positive change in her and she is now excited to be at the Club each day. Kylie has learned that science is all around her and a part of her everyday life! But more importantly, she has found her place, and an aptitude and interest in science, at the Club.

Her mom says she talks about being a scientist one day. She has made friends at the Club who think science is as cool as she does and her mentor at the Club is a biochemistry major at IU. Kylie's mom needs the Club, but now Kylie doesn't just come because she has to, she comes because she has found her place, and her people, here.

More than 1,000 people gave to and/or attended our fundraisers in 2022. Fundraising events last year raised nearly half a million dollars for Club kids. What a great night that raised more than \$120,000 for the Club and our mentoring programs for girls—thank you, Coach!
