




IMPACT & ACCESSIBILITY



Accessibility is at the core of our mission. To give children a chance to be seen, they have to be able to access the high-quality program the Club offers every day. The Club was open in 2025 for kids when they needed us most. Youth in our community had the opportunity to enjoy life-enriching opportunities last year—THANKS TO YOU!

In 2025...


- The Clubs had **3,217** registered members, an increase of 941 members in 2025.
- Between Lincoln Street, Ellettsville, Ferguson Crestmont, Owen County, and Camp Rock, the Clubs served as many as **708** youths per day, an increase of 45 members per day.
- The Club serves kids ages 5-18. Teen members make up those that are 13 and older - **415** teens were served.
- The Clubs served kids from **32** local schools in Monroe & Owen Counties.
- Thanks to organizations like The Community Kitchen, **62,184** meals and snacks were served to members.
- **503** local youth were served while school was out during Fall Break and Spring Break this year.
- **245** more members attended The Club for 100 Days or more in the 2024-2025 school year than in the 2023-2024 school year.




Thanks to the support of local donors, our membership costs remained affordable, even as all other prices increased. The Club keeps costs low for families so ALL kids have access to programs they need every day.

In 2025, the Club offered more than 100 special programs to spark a child's creativity and get them thinking about their future. These programs are offered at no additional cost to members of the Club. All programs are included in the \$ 20-a-year membership fee. Programs offer a variety of activities that are play-based and teach kids new skills and interests. Club programs may introduce kids to a lifelong passion, a hobby, or even a career interest. Some programs are core Club programs offered at all times, such as Homework Center. Others rotate in and out of the schedule based on member interest, staff expertise, and funding. Programs are based in the Club's core program focus areas—**Academic Success, Access to the Arts, Healthy Lifestyles, and Character & Leadership**. Listed are just some of the programs run in 2025.






A VISION TO REALIDAD

The Owen County Club set out to expand learning opportunities for its members by launching a Spanish Club designed to introduce a new language in an engaging and meaningful way. To bring this vision to life, the Club partnered with Boston Scientific's Hispanic Organization for Leadership and Achievement (HOLA). The HOLA team immediately recognized the importance of the initiative and committed volunteers to support members as they explored the Spanish language during the Spring of 2025.

The presence of dedicated, Spanish-speaking volunteers transformed the program into a welcoming and inspiring learning environment. Their energy, encouragement, and cultural connection helped members feel comfortable trying something new, building both curiosity and confidence. For many participants, this experience represented a rare opportunity to engage with a second language, expanding exposure beyond what is typically available in their school setting. With the guidance and support of the HOLA volunteers, one of the Club's youngest members, Lillee, age 7, quickly grew more comfortable participating in Spanish Club and began approaching each session with excitement. By the end of the program, she was confidently counting to ten in Spanish, a meaningful milestone that reflected both her growing confidence and the supportive environment created by the volunteers and Club staff.

The Spanish Club reflects the heart of the Club's mission: introducing young people to new opportunities, fostering confidence, and building meaningful connections through community partnership. Through the commitment of dedicated volunteers, this program opened new doors for Owen County youth.






NONPROFIT OF THE YEAR

When we opened the Owen County Club in May 2024, the goal was to serve kids and families across the county, especially those who needed us most even in the most rural areas. In partnership with Spencer-Owen Community School Corporation (SOCS), transportation was provided from Spencer and McCormick's Creek Elementary Schools to our main location at La Campagne. To reach additional students for whom transportation was not feasible, the Club worked with SOCS to open an on-site Boys & Girls Club location at Gosport Elementary in September 2024. Now in its second year, the Gosport site serves an average of 30 members per day through after-school programming. When school began in August 2025, after-school programming also launched at Patricksburg Elementary, serving an average of 20 members per day.

MIXING IT UP

In 2025, the Lincoln Street Club strengthened its commitment to the Boys & Girls Club mission by creating intentional opportunities for young people from across our community to connect, learn, and grow together. Serving youth from 17 different schools, the Club is uniquely positioned to bring together children who may not otherwise meet, creating meaningful connections across neighborhoods, backgrounds, and life experiences.


The launch of a mixed-age homeroom model further deepened this impact by fostering belonging, leadership, and positive peer relationships. Older members are encouraged to step into mentorship roles, while younger members benefit from guidance, encouragement, and positive role models. These relationships help build confidence, empathy, and a sense of responsibility toward others.

This approach reflects what the Boys & Girls Club does best: creating environments where young people feel seen, supported, and valued. By intentionally bringing together youth from different schools and age groups, the Club expands perspectives and helps young people develop the social and emotional skills needed to become caring, productive, and responsible citizens.

Looking ahead to 2026, the Lincoln Street Club remains focused on deepening these connections and strengthening partnerships with families, schools, and community partners to ensure every young person, especially those who need us most, has access to a safe, supportive place to belong and thrive.




LINCOLN STREET BY THE NUMBERS

CREATING CONNECTION


In March 2025, Boys & Girls Club of Bloomington (BGCB) sites administered the Boys & Girls Clubs of America National Youth Outcomes Initiative (NYOI) survey to members ages nine and older. This anonymous, nationally standardized survey captures youth perceptions of their Club experience and guides continuous improvement efforts. Across BGCB sites, staff implement systems and structures to ensure members feel safe, supported, and engaged.

The NYOI survey measures youth perceptions across five core areas: Safety, Academic Success, Healthy Lifestyles, Social and Emotional Development, and Overall Club Experience. For the second consecutive year, BGCB's results exceeded the national average, reflecting continued growth and progress across programs and sites. At the Steve & Connie Ferguson Crestmont Club, 2025 initiatives focused on strengthening consistent, positive relationships between staff and members. Staff were assigned to the same homerooms each day, allowing trust and familiarity to develop and enabling staff to better understand individual members and provide responsive, relationship-centered support.


This work is led by Unit Director LaTonya Benson, whose approach to youth development emphasizes consistency, high expectations, and building trusting relationships. While leading the Ferguson Crestmont Unit, LaTonya has also been her son Kahlil Benson's biggest fan, cheering him on as a standout athlete on Indiana University's undefeated Hoosier football team, which made history by winning the National Championship. The Benson family's commitment to community is a true family affair: Kahlil and the team have visited the Club to pass out toys and turkeys at Thanksgiving, connect with members, and serve as mentors, bringing the same spirit of teamwork, encouragement, and leadership from the field into the lives of local youth.

Under LaTonya's leadership, the Unit prioritized creating a culture of belonging, encouragement, and youth voice. Members are invited to share feedback, help shape activities, and take ownership of their Club experience. Over time, youth increasingly asked to extend their time at the Club, and some were reluctant to leave at the end of the day. Enrollment and participation in after-school programming grew steadily, with average daily attendance increasing from 81–93 prior to summer programming to 94–104.

Located in a part of the community where many families rely on the Club as a stable, consistent resource, the Ferguson Crestmont Club plays a critical role in ensuring youth feel supported, valued, and empowered. Through LaTonya's leadership and the dedication of her team, the Club remains a place where young people build resilience, develop confidence, and grow into caring, productive, and responsible citizens.


A NEW ERA OF GROWTH

Ellettsville Boys & Girls Club has entered a transformative period of growth, becoming a more vital resource for local families than ever before. Our after-school programming has seen a surge in energy and participation, with upwards of 266 members attending in a single afternoon, more kids than ever before. Even during the summer months, the Club remained a hub of activity, demonstrating that our commitment to providing a safe, engaging environment resonates year-round.

This growth has been supported by remarkable community partners and advocates. Glenn Harris of Harris Services generously helped renovate the gym, creating a space where members can engage in structured sports and high-energy activities. Grant funding from the Lilly Foundation made it possible to complete necessary updates throughout the facility, ensuring a modern, welcoming environment. Curry Auto contributed by purchasing a new bus, significantly increasing our transportation capacity and enabling more youth to safely travel from school to the Club. Additionally, Shelli Yoder played a pivotal role in securing a long-term lease with the Richland-Bean Blossom School Corporation, ensuring the Club has a stable home for years to come.

The synergy between these community contributions, our upgraded facilities, and our growing membership underscores a bright future for the Ellettsville Club. With the support of dedicated partners, the Club is more equipped than ever to fulfill its mission.



CAMP ROCK EXPANSION

In August of 2025, we broke ground on the new Lee & Annie Marchant Cabin at Camp Rock. This building will replace a current building that has been on the property since the 1960s. The extra indoor space will allow for 50 more campers to join Camp Rock weekly making for 500 more campers yearly, starting in the summer of 2027.

Camp Rock is such a special program for our organization and we are thrilled at the opportunity to have more campers experience summer on the lake.

SUMMER LEARNING LABS



2025 marked an important summer for The Boys & Girls Clubs of Bloomington: We started our Summer Learning Labs programs! This program was launched by The Mind Trust and United Way of Central Indiana to combat COVID learning loss and funded by Indiana Department of Education.


Summer Learning Labs are a fun, high-quality academic enrichment program designed to support student growth, prevent summer learning loss, and keep students on track for the upcoming school year.

Summer Learning Labs ran for 5 weeks (June 16-July 18) in the summer of 2025 at the Ellettsville, Ferguson Crestmont and Owen County locations. Summer Learning Labs provided FREE programming for all attending members from 7:30 am - 6:00 pm daily.

Summer Learning Labs were held each morning over those 5 weeks and were led by local, certified teachers.

On an average day, members arrived between 7:30 and 9:00 am for breakfast and some free fun time! They then reported to their homerooms and began with a welcome activity with their teachers. All classes read books aloud, worked on phonics, and transitioned to math. Members had plenty of breaks and times for recess.

After lunch at 12:00 pm, members then had the option to join a variety of special programs for the remainder of the day. Afternoon programming consisted of all the usual things that the Boys & Girls Club has to offer during summer programming: field trips, weekly trips to the pool, and plenty of sunshine!




The annual staff retreat is a great opportunity for staff to regroup, refresh, and reset for the school year ahead! This helps us to achieve our core value of Excellence.

WHAT'S NEXT?



2026 marks the 70th year of The Boys & Girls Clubs of Bloomington. Since 1956, we've been serving the kids that need us most.

Chartered in 1956, the organization opened at the Lincoln Street location and has since served thousands of children in Bloomington. In 1990, the Crestmont location opened in the Bloomington Housing Authority neighborhood. In 1992, the current name (Boys & Girls Clubs of Bloomington) was adopted as the organization began serving girls. The Clubs saw continued growth, and an Ellettsville unit opened in 2009. With the help of the local community, BGCB expanded our presence in the BHA Crestmont neighborhood with the opening of the Steve & Connie Ferguson Crestmont Club in 2019. The capacity of this Club increased from 40 kids per day in the previous location to 225 kids per day in the new building. In 2018, the Club also renovated and expanded the historic Lincoln Street Club, increasing capacity there from 200 to more than 250 kids per day.

In May of 2024, the Club expanded into Owen County serving kids in three locations in the community there. In Owen County, we opened a stand-alone facility that serves 60 kids each day and a school-based site at Gosport Elementary School serving 30 kids each day. In 2025, we also opened a school-based site at Patricksburg Elementary School, serving an additional 25 members per day.

In addition to our Club locations, our American Camp Association accredited outdoor facility on Lake Lemon provides summer camp programming to over 300 campers each year. Camp Rock was established in 1970 and has seen facility growth with the additions of the Art & Outdoor Education building in 2011 and the Art & Wilma Hill Boathouse in 2014. Camp Rock is continuing to grow, with plans to rebuild a new facility on the property in 2026.
